NZEI members have rejected the government's latest offer and voted to:

- strike on Wednesday 31 May
- ban meetings outside of 8:30am to 4:30pm from 1 30 June.

However, due to a process initiated by the Minister of Education with NZEI and PPTA to progress collective agreement negotiations, any decision on moving forward with these industrial actions has been *paused*.
